

JOHN FAYTER, PRIVATE 27698, 6th & 7th BATTALIONS, DEVON AND CORNWALL LIGHT INFANTRY
23 AUGUST 1894-5 DECEMBER 1982

John was the younger son of Harry, or Henry, Fayter and his wife Catherine. The family, traceable back through earlier Censuses, seem for many years to have been settled in the Aylesbeare/Newton Poppleford/Woodbury area, and John was born in Woodbury in August 1894. They were not a large family, two sons and a daughter, and in 1911 were still living in Globe Hill, Woodbury – except that on Census day Harry, who was a carpenter and joiner, happened not to be there. We haven't yet been able to trace where he was. John in 1911 was working as a mason's apprentice.

We then lose sight of John until he re-appears in the Army as a Private in the 6th & 7th Btns of the DCLI. His link with BSM is his appearance, with his brother William, on the 1918 Absent Voters' Register at Coombsbury [Combesbury], along with his parents on the regular 1918 Register of Electors. His parents then disappear from the Register, his father having died in 1918, and his mother moving elsewhere.

Both the 6th and 7th Battalions were part of Kitchener's New Army. The 6th (Service) Battalion was formed in Bodmin in August 1914 under the command of 43rd Brigade in 14th (Light) Division. They were deployed to the Western Front landing in Boulogne on 22nd May 1915; remaining there until they were disbanded in France on 20th February 1918. The 7th (Service) Battalion was formed in Bodmin in September 1914 under the command of 61st Brigade in 20th (Light) Division. They were deployed to the Western Front, landing in Boulogne on 25th July 1915 and remaining there until the end of the war in 1918.

We know nothing of the details of John's service, except that he probably didn't join, possibly through conscription, till 1916, as he earned no 1915 Star for service overseas before the year end. His papers don't reveal when he was discharged, though this was usually in 1919. In 1916 he'd married Annie Carter at Exeter St Thomas (maybe prompted by being called up), and by the end of the war they too had moved to Somerset, John working as a farmer. Their daughter Marjory was born on 18 March 1920, but lived only three days. A second daughter, Emily, was born in 1921, but on 23 March 1923 Annie died, at School Farm, Otterford.

In 1926 John married again; his second wife was Ethel May Gillard, born in 1892 in Taunton. John and Ethel had three children – John was born in 1927; followed by twins Reginald and Stanley on 22nd May 1930. Tragedy was to strike the family again as Stanley died on 17th August 1930, just five months old. In 1938 John and Ethel, and their two surviving children John and Reginald, were living at 9 High Street, Tiverton, in Devon. John was a gardener/handyman. But what had happened to Emily, the surviving daughter of his first marriage? We haven't been able to find her.

John died on 5th December 1982 in Bampton, Devon – he was living at 9 West Street - and is buried in the churchyard of St Michael & All Angels there. He left £32,141.

OTTERTON is a parish and village on the eastern bank of the river Otter, near the English Channel and the road from Sidmouth to Topsham, with a station called East Budleigh on the branch line of the London and South Western railway from Tipton St. John to Budleigh Salterton; it is 3½ miles south-west-by-west from Sidmouth and 12 south-east from Exeter, in the Eastern division of the county, East Budleigh hundred, petty sessional division of Woodbury, union of St. Thomas, county court district of Exeter, rural deanery of Aylesbeare and arch-deaconry and diocese of Exeter. The village is supplied with water from Peak Hill, laid on in 1905, and including hydrants for use in case of fire; there is also an efficient drainage system. The church of St. Michael was rebuilt, with the exception of the ancient tower, in 1871 by Lady Rolle, at a cost of about £12,000, under the direction of the late Mr. Benjamin Ferrey F.S.A. and is an edifice of stone in the Decorated style and consists of chancel, nave of four bays, aisles, north and south porches and a tower with low spire at the east end of the south aisle, containing a clock with chimes and 6 bells: the very fine carved stone retables, the pulpit and other carved work in the church was executed by Hems, of Exeter, and there are brasses to the Duke family, to whom the manor was granted by Henry VIII.; these include one to Richard Duke esq. ob. 1641, with 5 sons and 2 daughters, and another to Sarah (Reynell), wife of Robert Duke esq. ob. 1641, with 3 sons and 5 daughters: the piers of the nave arcade are formed of single shafts of marble: there are 530 sittings. The register dates from the year 1559. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £250, including 24 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Lord Clinton, and held since 1910 by the Rev. Richard Seymour B.A. of Keble College, Oxford. Here is a Wesleyan chapel, built in 1894 and seating about 100 persons. There are charities of about £40 yearly, chiefly arising from the interest of £1,000, given by the late Rev. James Boucher M.A. of Budleigh Salterton (d. 1901), to be applied for the benefit of the poor of this parish. Ladram Bay, to the east of the village, is a picturesque spot, and much visited by

OTTERY ST. MARY is a market town and an extensive parish, forming a hundred in itself, and is head of a petty sessional division, with a station on the Sidmouth branch of the London and South Western railway and 1½ south from the main road from London to Exeter, and is 168 miles by road and 162 by rail from London, 12 east

in the gift of the vicar of St. Thomas's, Exeter, and held since 1902 by the Rev. John Henry Prince M.A. of Oxford University, and vicar of St. Thomas's, Exeter to which benefice the chapelry has been certain, attached since 1606, if not earlier. This chapelry of district, now comprising five estates, covering together 820 acres, was granted by Henry VIII. in 1539, together with the abbey of Tavistock, to John Baron Russell K.G. afterwards 1st Earl of Bedford and ancestor of the present Duke of Bedford; it is now the property of Arthur Tremayne Buller esq. J.P. of Downes, Crediton who is lord of the manor.

The nearest post offices are Whitestone or Tedburn St. Mary, Exeter. The nearest money order & telegraph office is at Crediton, 3 miles distant. Letters through Exeter, via Whitestone, daily, about 10.30 a.m. The children of this place attend the schools at Whitestone & Tedburn St. Mary

tourists. Here was anciently a Benedictine priory, which, in the reign of King John, was a cell to the Abbey of Mount St. Michael, in Normandy; at the Dissolution the revenues were estimated at £87. Lord Clinton is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is partly heavy and partly light loam; subsoil is chiefly red sand. The crops are wheat, barley, oats and roots. The area is 3,431 acres of land, 15 of water, 12 of tidal water and 122 of foreshore; rateable value, £4,122; the population in 1911 was 617, including Dotton farm and mill.

NORTHMOSTOWN, 3½ miles north; PASSAFORD, 2 north; PITSON, 2½ north, and PINN, 2 north-east, are hamlets in this parish.

Below is an account of the Fayter Brothers, researched and written by Mike Canham; this forms the basis for their biographies.

There is no direct Fayter/BSM link on Ancestry or Find My Past

I think – because the two brothers names show, and the Otterford residence in 1920 to 1923 – these two were born in Woodbury, Devon

Parents

Harry John Fayter - born 1st May 1862 in Aylesbeare, Devon; died in Chard (this probably means Chard District) on 29th November 1918. Harry was a farmer and carpenter.

Catherine Jane Fayter (nee Troake) – born about 1862 in Woodbury, Devon; died 11th April 1935 in Christchurch (then Hampshire, now Dorset).

. By the time John was born they were living in Globe Hill Road.

JOHN FAYTER

Born 23rd August 1894. the family were living in Globe Hill Road in Woodbury, Devon in Woodbury, Devon;

1901 Census – still living in Woodbury, Devon

1911 Census – still living at Globe Hill, Woodbury, Devon with parents/brother/sister. At 16/17 years old he was a Mason's Apprentice.

War time service – a Private in the 6th Bttn (and later the 7th Bttn), the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, Service No 27698.

Both the 6th and 7th Battalions were part of Kitchener's New Army. The 6th (Service) Battalion was formed in Bodmin, August 1914 under the command of 43rd Brigade in 14th (Light) Division. They were deployed to the Western Front landing in Boulogne on 22nd May 1915; remaining there until they were disbanded in France on 20th February 1918. The 7th (Service) Battalion was formed in Bodmin in September 1914 under the command of 61st Brigade in 20th (Light) Division. They were deployed to the Western Front landing in Boulogne on 25th July 1915, remaining there until the end of the war in 1918.

John was not awarded the 1914-15 Medal – indicating he joined later and may well have been conscripted. That said, Forces War Records attributes his service record to 1914?

In 1926 John married again – his second wife was Ethel May Gillard – born 1st 6th August 1892 in Taunton, died 22nd April 1987 in Bampton, Tiverton, Devon.

John and Ethel had three children – John G Fayter was born in Wellington in the 2nd Q of 1927; followed by twins Reginald and Stanley (oddly Reginald was shown as born in Wellington and Stanley in Culmstock! on 22nd May 1930. Tragedy was to strike the family again as Stanley died on 17th August 1930, just five months old.

In 1938 John and Ethel, and their two surviving children John G and Reginald, were living at 9 High Street, Tiverton, in Devon. John was a gardener/handyman.

John died on 5th December 1982 in Bampton, Tiverton, Devon – and is buried in the churchyard of St Michael & All Angels there.

The parish register dates from 1558, but is extremely defective, large portions having been destroyed about 1810 by the churchwarden, who, being a shopkeeper, used up the older registers as waste paper, but recourse can be had to the transcripts in the Diocesan Registry. The living is a perpetual curacy, net yearly value £200, including 32 acres of glebe, with residence at Bishop's Wood.
